- Hear from relevant academics & organisations on range of work being done in this field
- Discuss knowledge gaps/progress barriers and ways of addressing these
- Identify key channels for in-country knowledge exchange and capacity building
- Outline the UK's potential contribution to filling knowledge gaps and building capacity

Why this is important

Pollinator declines have the potential to negatively affect communities in developing countries in a variety of ways, from reducing crop yields and value of crop products, to increasing the volatility of food prices, reducing access to micronutrient supplies and threatening income from honey production. Barriers to addressing these issues include a regionally-biased evidence base, important knowledge gaps and lack of capacity in the developing world. This webinar brings together relevant parties to discuss these challenges.

14.00 | Tom Timberlake (meeting chair) – UKCDS

A pollination ecology PhD student, currently working with the UKCDS as a Pollination and International Development Researcher, Tom will open the meeting with an overview of the relevance of pollination to international development, outlining the aims and scope of the webinar. Through her ongoing work with the FAO, Barbara has brought pollination and agroecology to the forefront of the FAO's agenda. Living and working in Africa for over 25 years, she has been very much at the heart of pollination research in the developing world. In 2009 she built a global project on pollination services, implemented across 7 developing countries and continues to advise the CBD and FAO on an updated International Pollinator Initiative, which she will talk about today



14.25 | Hien Ngo – IPBES Secretariat

As the Technical Support Unit Head and co-drafting author of the IPBES Pollination assessment, Hien will outline the wide-ranging impact and legacy that the IPBES report has had around the world, including incorporation of its findings into the Convention on Biological Diversity.



14.35 | Samuel Myers - Harvard University

An early pioneer of the field of Planetary Health, Sam's research looks at the ways in which the changing environment is affecting human health. This includes the topic he will speak about today: the ways in which pollinator declines impact upon human health through reducing yields of nutritionally important crops and shifting human diets.



14.45 | Janet Lowore – Bees for Development

Programme manager for Africa, Janet will talk about her organisation's experience of using beekeeping as a tool for improving livelihoods and promoting sustainable development across the world.
